# HOW DO THE U.S. CENSUS BUREAU'S NEW UNINSURED NUMBERS STACK UP AGAINST OTHER ESTIMATES?

In September 2010, the U.S. Census Bureau released uninsured estimates from two different federal surveys of U.S. households. Estimates derived from the American Community Survey (ACS) reflected the number and percent of individuals who reported being uninsured at the time of the 2009 survey. Estimates from the Current Population Survey (CPS) included the number and percentage of Americans who lacked health insurance coverage in calendar year 2009. These surveys plus Colorado's own 2008-09 Colorado Household Survey (COHS) provide three sources of data about the number and percentage of uninsured Coloradans. How do the uninsured estimates from the three sources compare?


#### ACS and CPS

Estimates from the 2009 ACS (which replaced the long form of the 2010 U.S. Census) indicate that 15.8 percent of Coloradans reported being uninsured at the time they were surveyed, compared to the U.S. uninsured rate of 15.1 percent. The Census Bureau has released demographic, housing, social and economic data from the ACS since 2005 but has collected health insurance data only since 2008. Therefore, only single-year health insurance estimates are currently available for places with populations of 65,000 or more. Additional health insurance estimates for areas with a population of at least 20,000 will become available in 2011 when three years of data have been collected.

According to the CPS, the number of uninsured people in the United States grew from 46.3 mil-

lion to 50.7 million between 2008 and 2009, while the uninsured rate increased from 15.4 percent to 16.7 percent of the population.<sup>3</sup> The new CPS estimates also suggest that Colorado's uninsured rate in 2008-09 was 15.6 percent, a non-significant (statistically speaking) decrease from 16.8 percent in 2006-07 with the number of uninsured Coloradans decreasing from 813,000 in 2006-07 to 771,000 in 2008-09 (see Graph 1).<sup>4</sup>

# What might account for this decrease in Colorado's uninsured?

CHI's preliminary analyses of the CPS data suggest that the percentage of Coloradans covered by public insurance programs (Medicare, Medicaid, Child Health Plan Plus [CHP+] or military) increased from 21 percent in 2006-07 to 25 percent in 2008-09. The increase in government coverage by four percentage points represents an estimated 225,000 people.


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Consistent with this finding, the Colorado Department of Health Care Policy and Financing's enrollment data for the Medicaid and CHP+ programs confirm significant increases in the caseloads of both programs during this period. The CPS data suggest that as the economic recession deepened between 2008 and 2009, more Coloradans enrolled in Medicaid and CHP+ due to increasing unemployment, a commensurate decline of employer-sponsored health insurance coverage and expanded enrollment efforts by the current administration.

### Colorado Household Survey<sup>5</sup>

In 2009, with data from the 2008-09 COHS, sponsored by the Colorado Department of Health Care Policy and Financing and funded by The Colorado Trust, CHI estimated that nearly 14 percent of all Coloradans (approximately 678,000 individuals) reported being uninsured at the time of the survey, which was administered between November 2008 and March 2009. Interestingly, the estimates produced by CHI were quite different depending on the time period for which respondents were asked to report their uninsured status (Graph 2).


Graph 2. Percent of Coloradans who were uninsured, 2008-09

Approximately 10 percent of Coloradans indicated they were uninsured for the entire 12 months prior to being surveyed, while 19 percent were uninsured at some point in the past year. Of these, the majority (81%) reported being uninsured for at least four months (Graph 3).

Sub-state data are also available from the COHS, which was specifically designed to produce reliable uninsurance estimates for 21 sub-state regions. These regions consist of individual counties or groups of counties and cover every region of Colorado.

Table I displays estimates of national and state uninsured rates and numbers from the CPS, ACS and COHS as well as county uninsured estimates (where available)<sup>6</sup> from the ACS and COHS. Supplementary estimates for regions and municipalities not included on the table can be found by browsing to the following links:

Why do uninsurance estimates differ as much as they do? State-specific surveys, such as the COHS, often yield lower uninsured estimates than national surveys because of differences in survey methods.<sup>8</sup> The reporting period, data collection methods and definitions of uninsurance all contribute to these differences. ### Common themes of the three surveys

Although the uninsured estimates from the three surveys differ, a synthesis of the three reveals that hundreds of thousands of Coloradans reported being uninsured at the point at which they were asked, and that the majority of these were uninsured for much of the prior year. Additional analyses (not reported in this brief) reveal that adults have higher uninsured rates than children. CHI will be assessing the recent data releases to further elucidate common themes between the CPS, ACS and COHS and explain differences that might result from these different surveys.

- <sup>2</sup> Because of revisions made retrospectively to the 2008 health insurance variables, the U.S. Census Bureau has re-released its 2008 health insurance estimates. In its guidance about comparing the 2008 and 2009

- estimates (available under Health Insurance at <a href="http://bit.ly/comparingestimates">http://bit.ly/comparingestimates</a>), the Bureau indicates that the prior 2008 estimates are NOT comparable to the 2009 estimates and only the revised 2008 estimates should be compared. Based on CHI's preliminary estimates, the revised 2008 uninsured rate for Colorado is 16.7% or 811,649 (compared with the old 2008 estimate of 17.2% or 834,000 individuals). 2009 estimates are displayed in Table I. CHI will be analyzing the re-released data and providing further information about the implications.

- <sup>4</sup> The U.S. Census Bureau typically reports national uninsured rates and numbers using single years of CPS data, and recommends using non-overlapping two-year averages for assessing state-level uninsured trends over time. CHI has adopted these recommendations and typically uses three-year averages when comparing sub-populations such as uninsured rates among Colorado's children.

- <sup>7</sup> Although the CPS asks respondents to report their insurance status over the past calendar year, recent research has found that the CPS more closely approximates point-in-time insurance estimates derived from other national surveys and concluded that the CPS is a poor measure of full-year uninsured status.
