

- 440 bill passed
- Health care: Not much media attention, but important part of session

SB 13-200: Medicaid Expansion

- Increases adult income eligibility to 133 percent FPL (effectively 138 percent)
- Yes votes from all Democrats and one Republican






Health Care and the Budget

Fiscal Year 2013-14: General Fund Appropriations by Department

FY 2013-14 General Funds

Total: \$8 billion (5.5% increase)



FY 2013-14 Total Funds

Total: \$21.9 billion (6% increase)



The Budget and Behavioral Health

Major Investments:



for a new statewide behavioral health crisis response system



in additional funding for community-based mental health centers



for enhanced mental health services for criminal offenders



for a new 20-bed jail-based center to treat defendants who are incompetent to stand trial

- Money for increased
 Enhanced substance community behavioral abuse disorder benefits **health resources** in schools
 - for Medicaid clients



Other Budget Highlights

- Two percent across the board increase for most Medicaid providers.
- Adding 7.4 full-time employees to the Department of Health Care Policy and Financing.
- Overhauling the Medicaid Management Information System.
- Reducing waiting lists for those with developmental disabilities.
- Increased funding for
 - Federally Qualified Health Centers and Rural Health Centers.
 - Medicaid-eligible women with breast or cervical cancer
 - Rural residency programs
 - School-based health center grants





Looking Ahead

Five Trends to Anticipate in 2014

- 1. Regulatory tweaks with full implementation of federal health care reform.
- 2. Continual improvements and innovations in Medicaid program.
- 3. Ongoing scrutiny of recreational marijuana policies.
- Legislation from task forces and committees convening during summer and fall.
- 5. Tension between education and health care funding.
