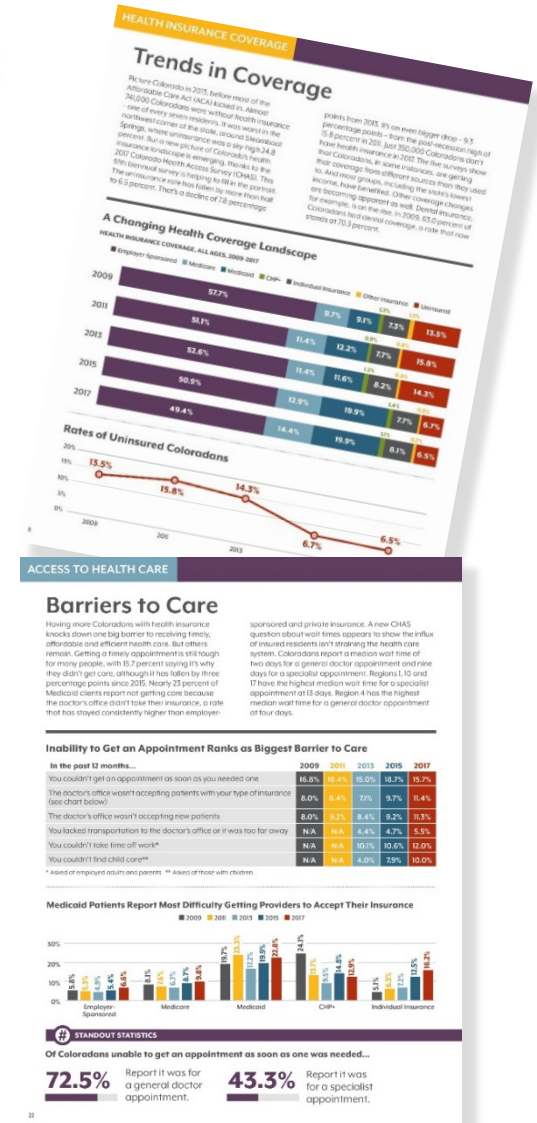


The Stories

- **Coverage:**
No change on the surface, but still waters run deep
- **Food, Housing, and Health:**

What is the CHAS?

- Colorado Health Access Survey
- 10,000 Households
- Fielded February – June 2019
- Topics include:
 - Access
 - Insurance
 - Use of Care
 - Affordability
 - Health Status
 - Behavioral Health
 - Social Factors



Previous Survey Method: Random Digit Dial (RDD)

1

Phone Call:

Surveyor randomly calls home and cell phones to conduct interview.

Reasons for methods change:

Federal policies, spam call flagging, increased telemarketing, and a general hesitation to answer the phone from unknown phone numbers have all reduced telephone response rates while significantly increasing cost.

Redesigned Survey Method: Address-Based Sample (ABS)

1

Letter:

An initial letter with secure access code invites people to take the survey online or by phone.

2

Postcard:

A postcard is sent reminding respondents to participate.

3

Final Reminder:

A final letter is sent with a deadline to complete the survey.

4

Comparison Sample:

Surveyor calls a smaller sample using the previous survey method for trending and analysis.

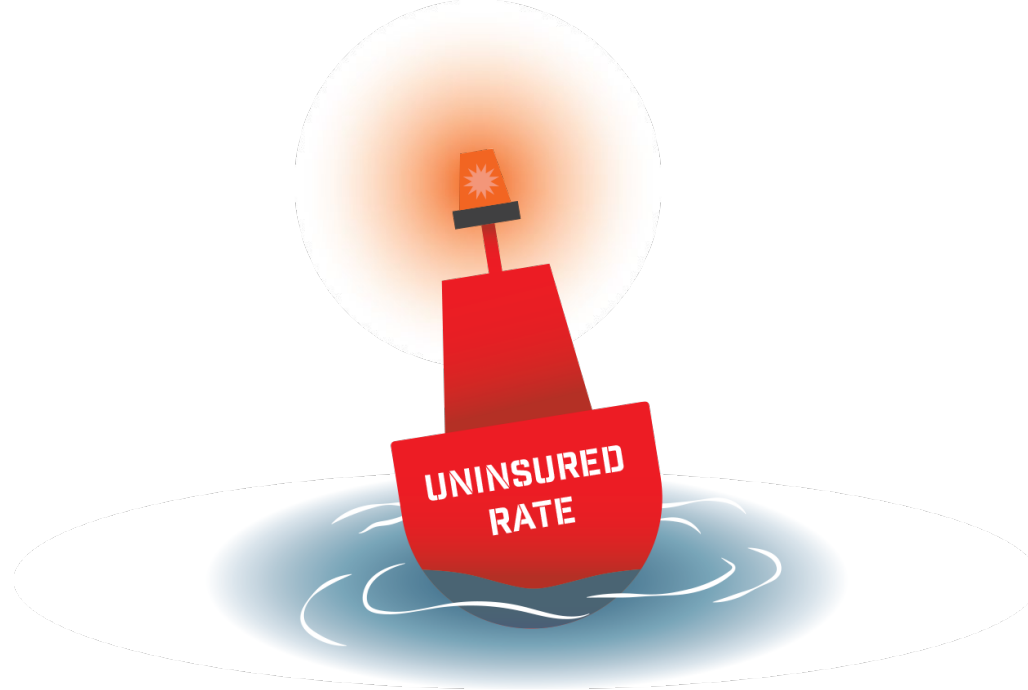

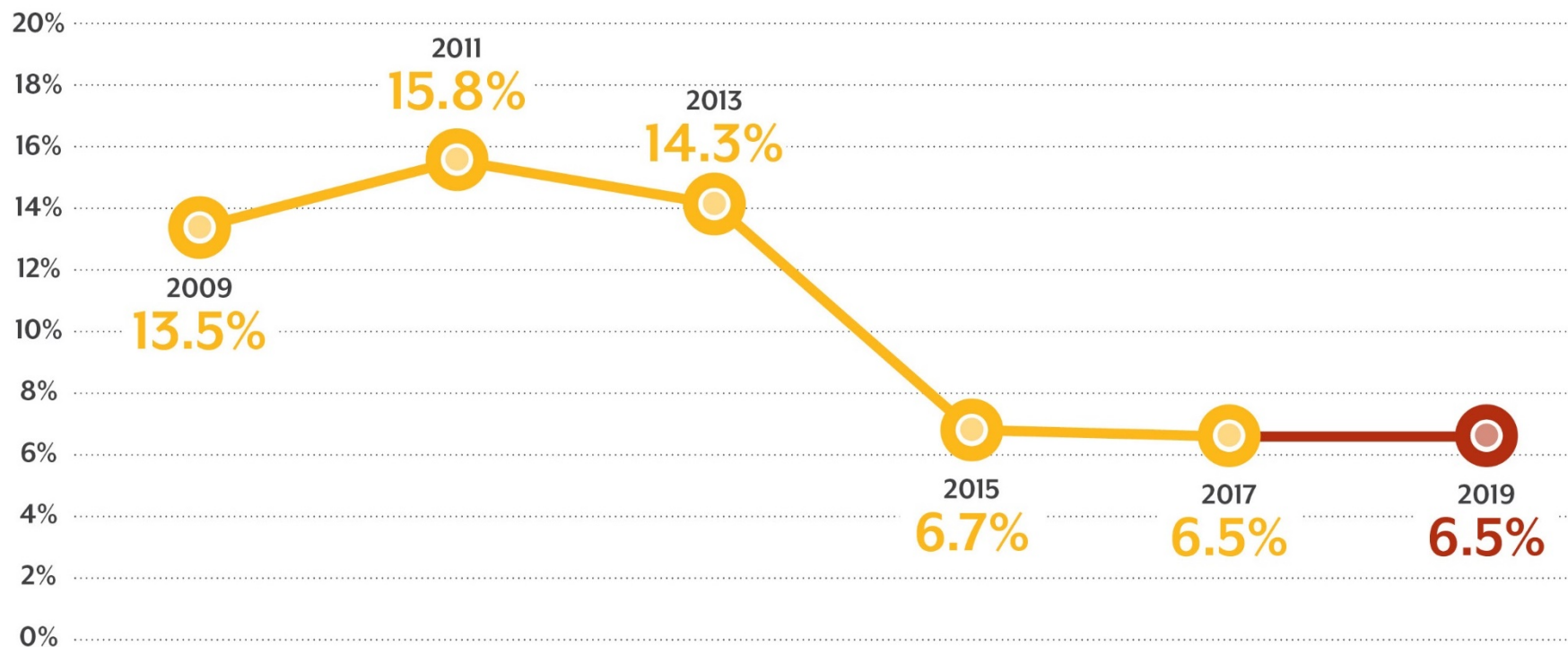

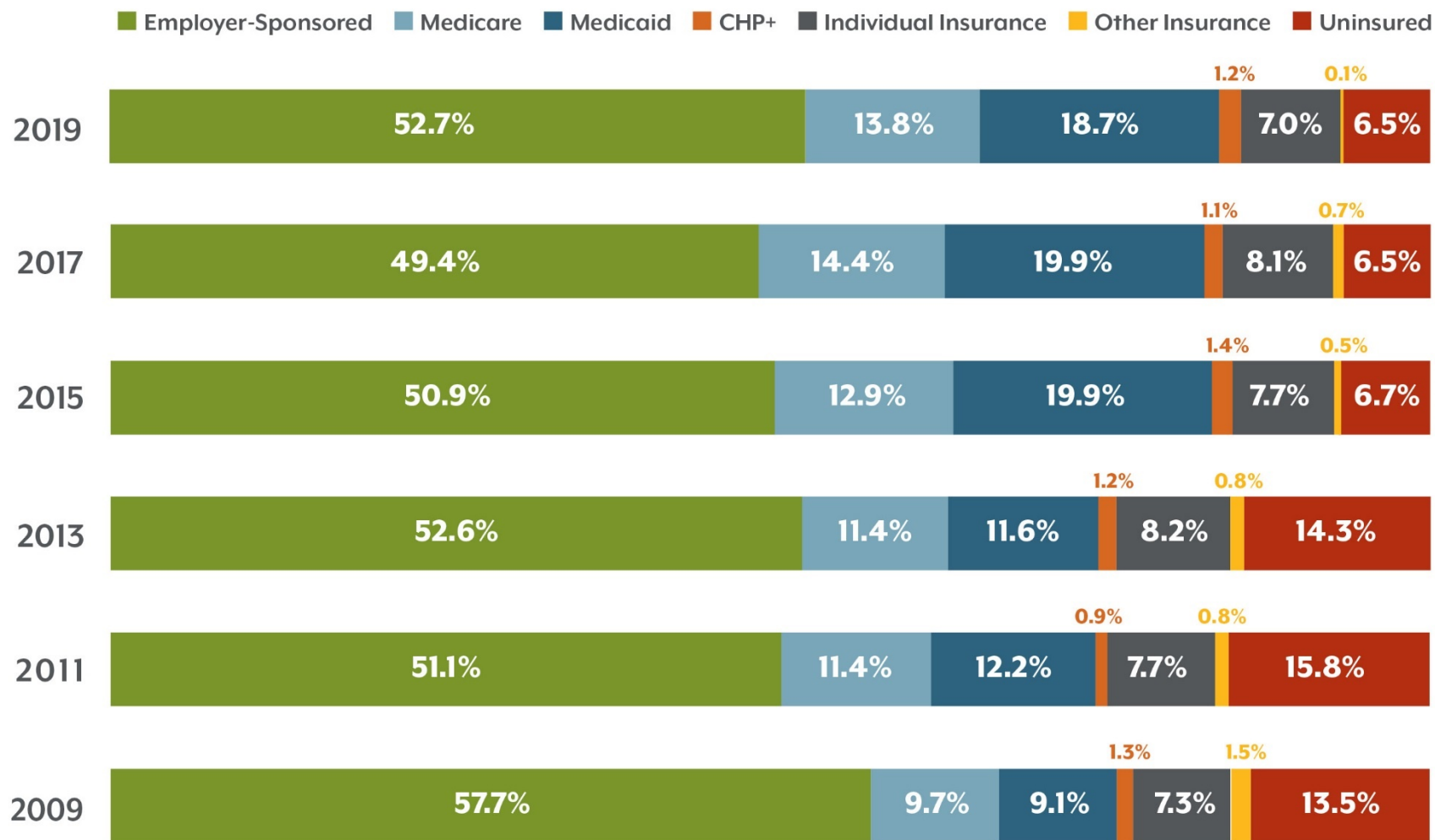
And Colorado's New Uninsured Rate Is . . .

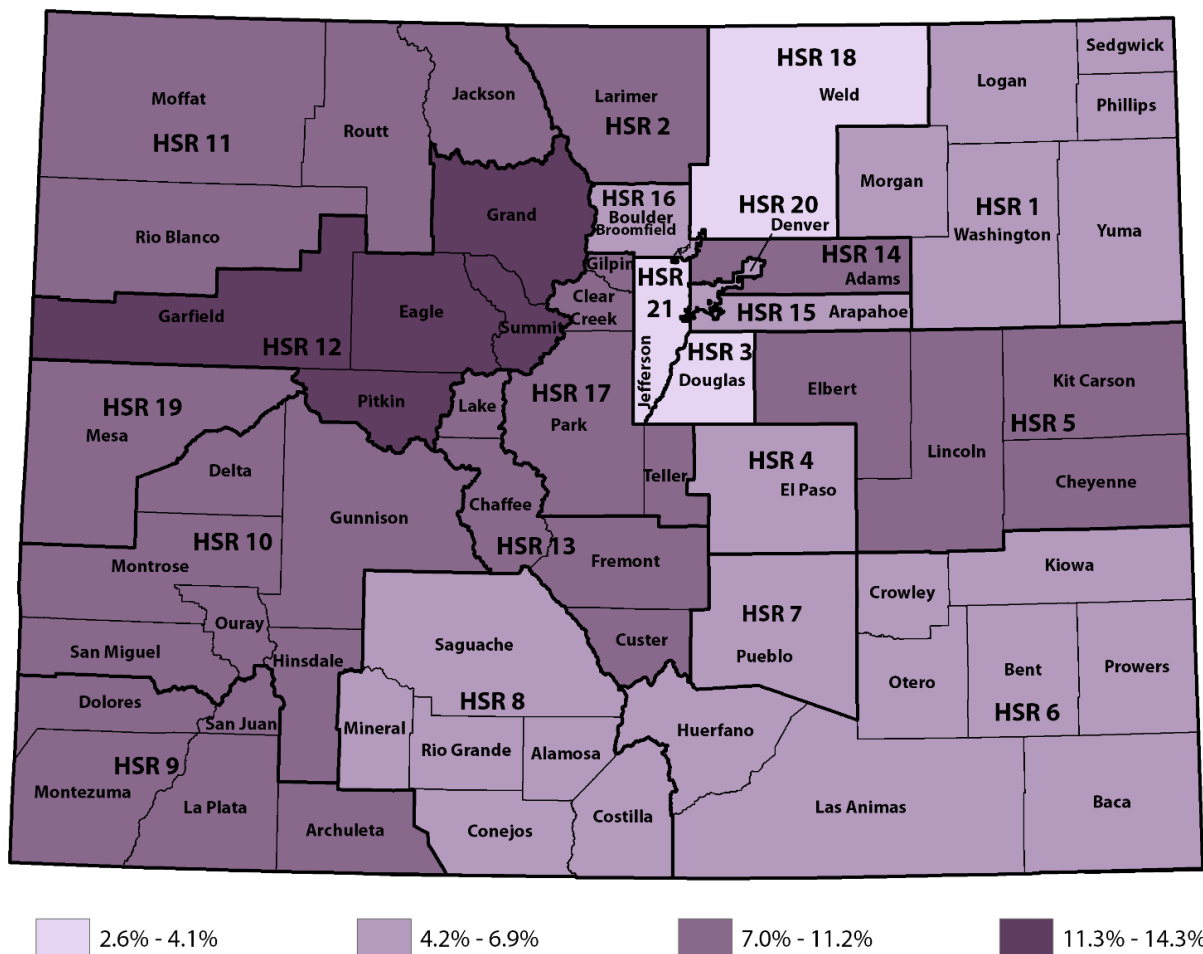
A Changing Health Coverage Landscape

Health Insurance Coverage, All Ages, 2009-2019



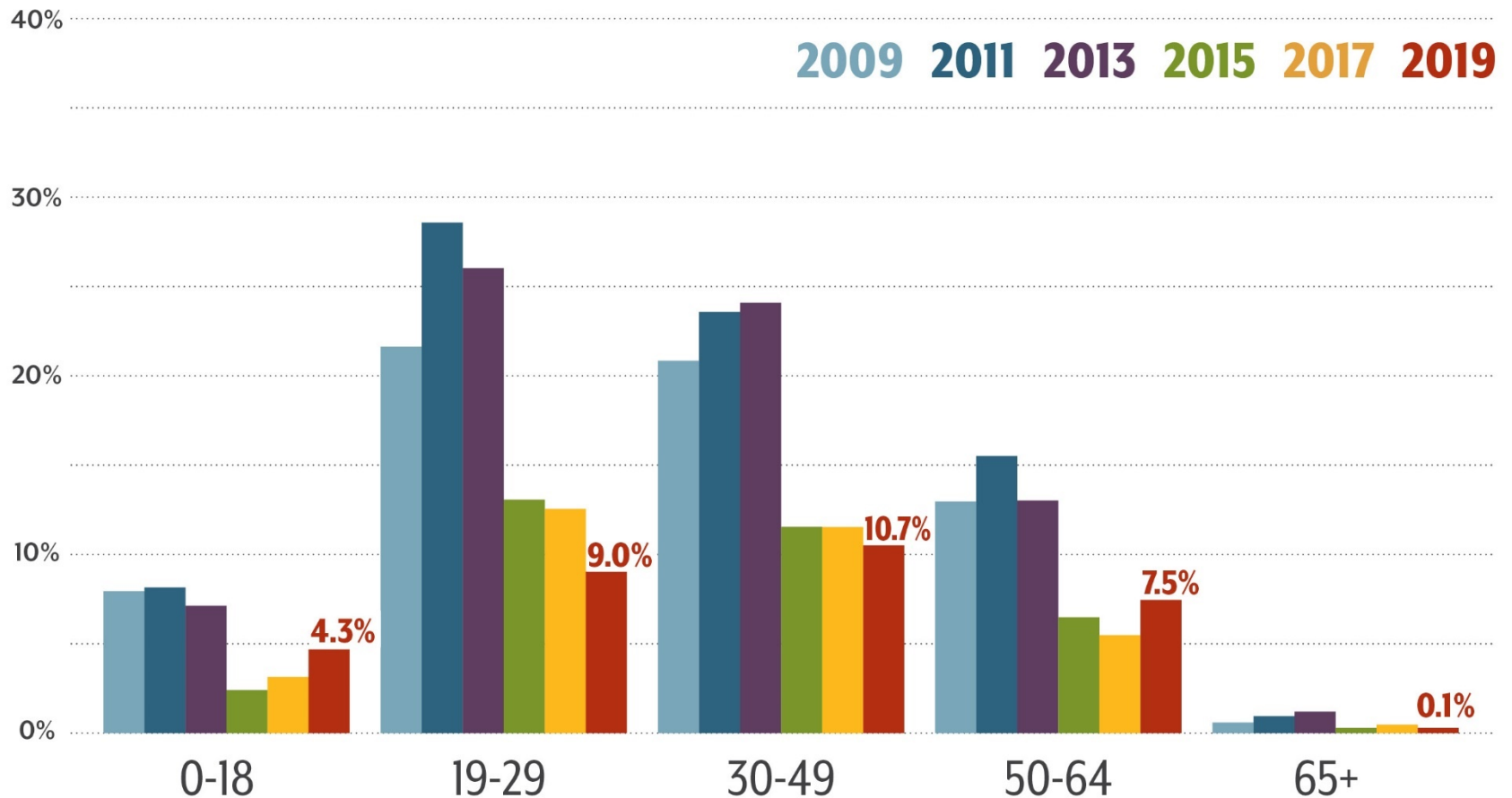
Insurance: A Familiar Pattern

Percent Uninsured, 2019



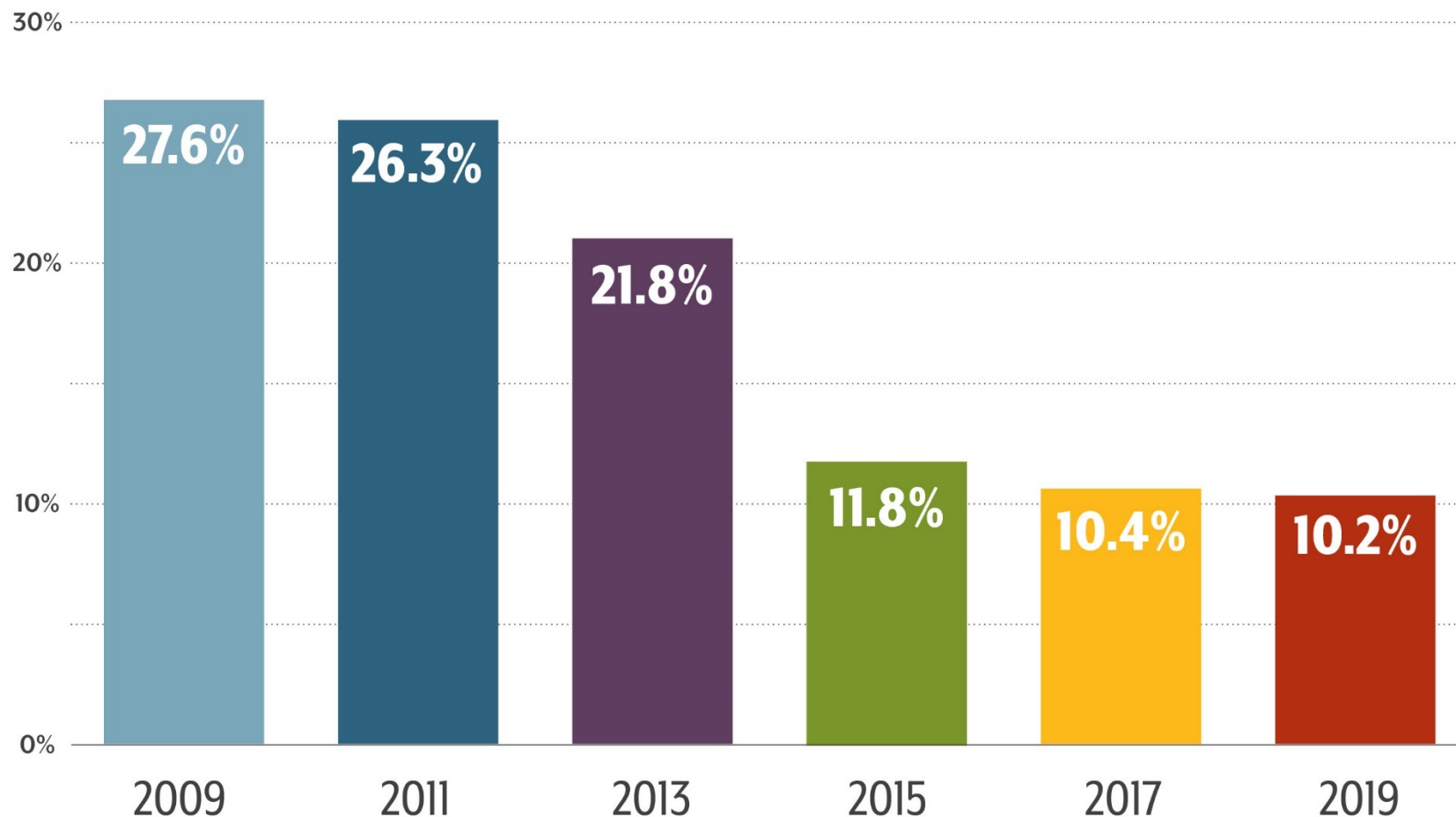

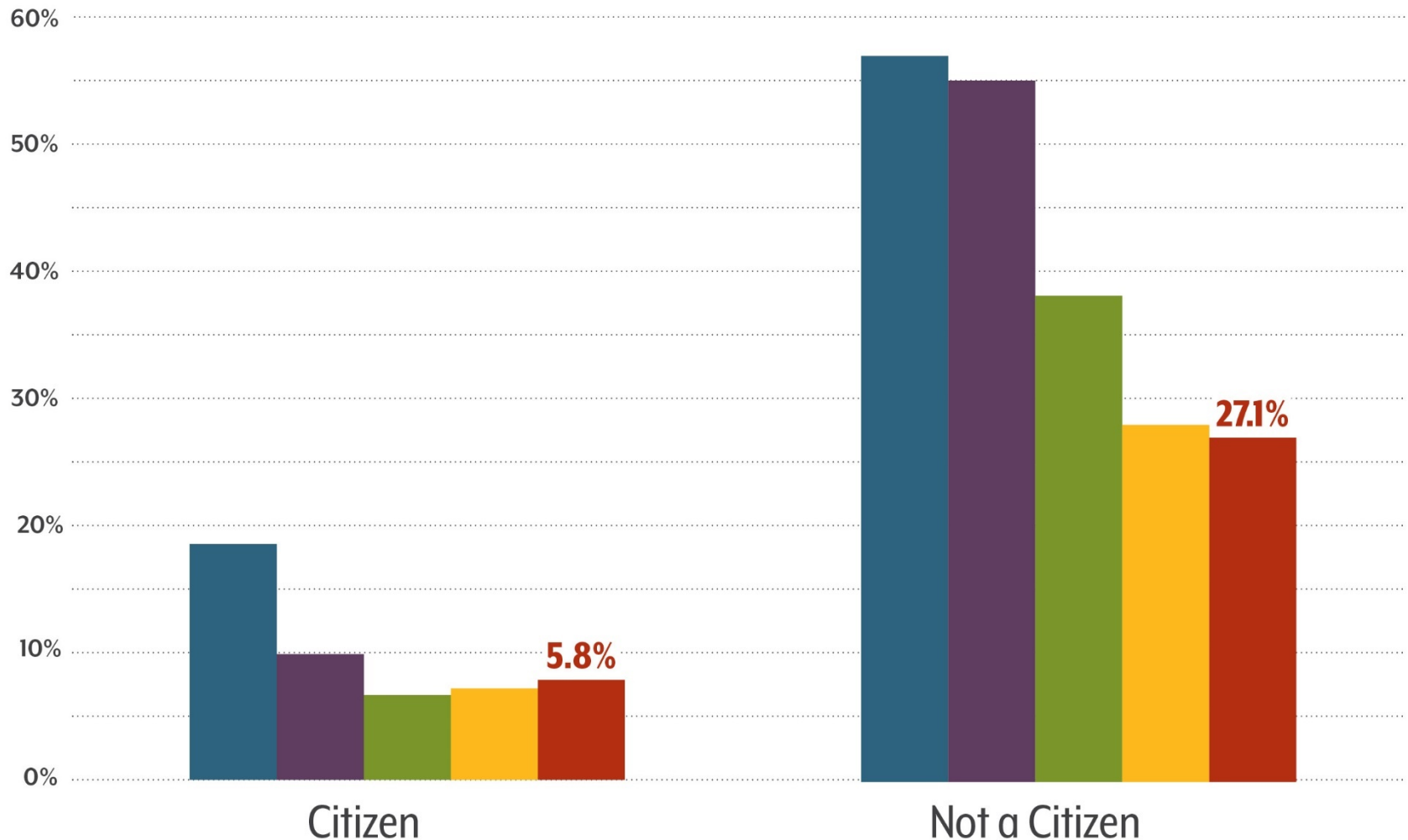
Uninsured Rate Among Coloradans Who Identify as Hispanic or Latino

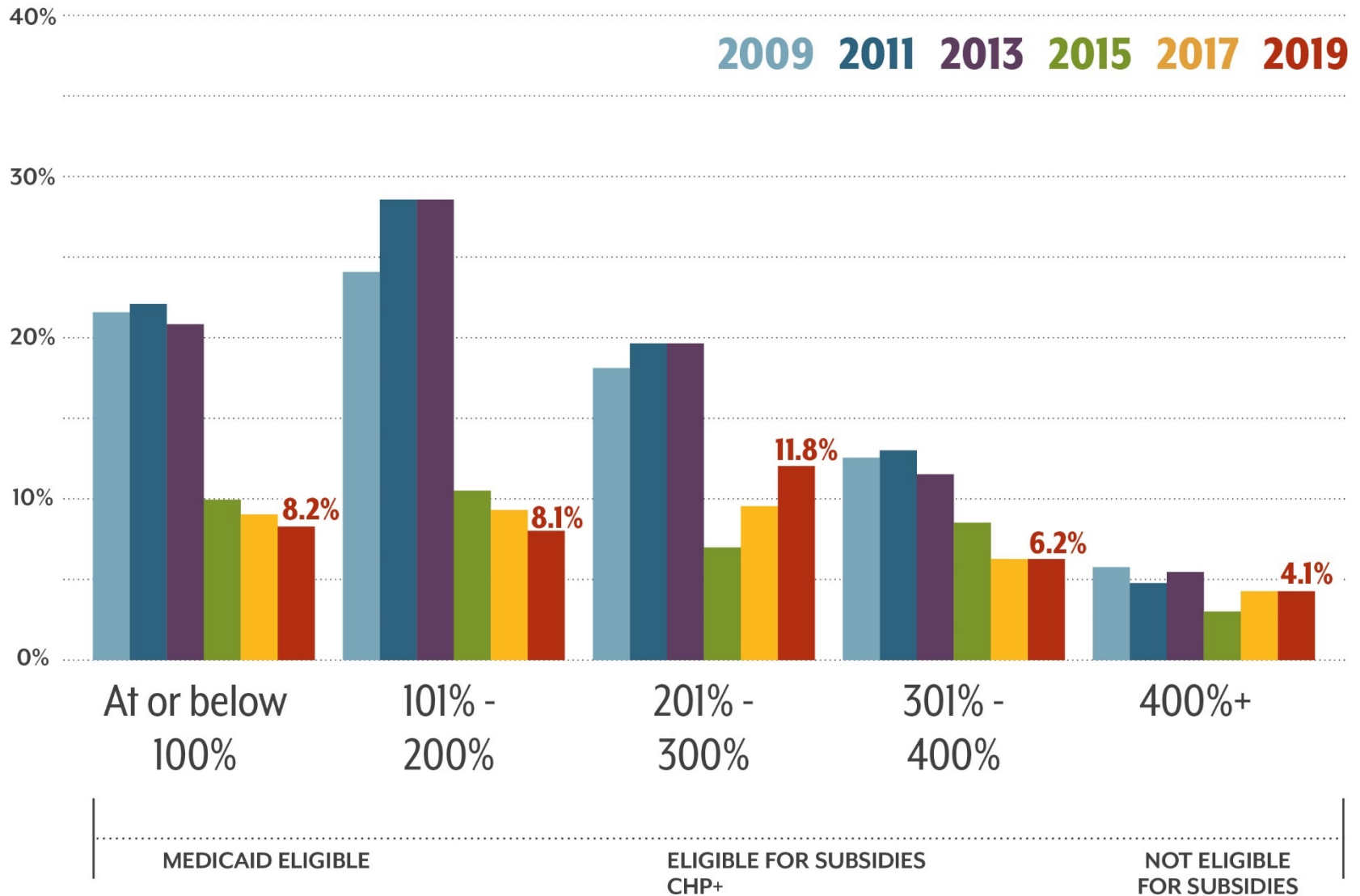
Uninsured Rate by Citizenship

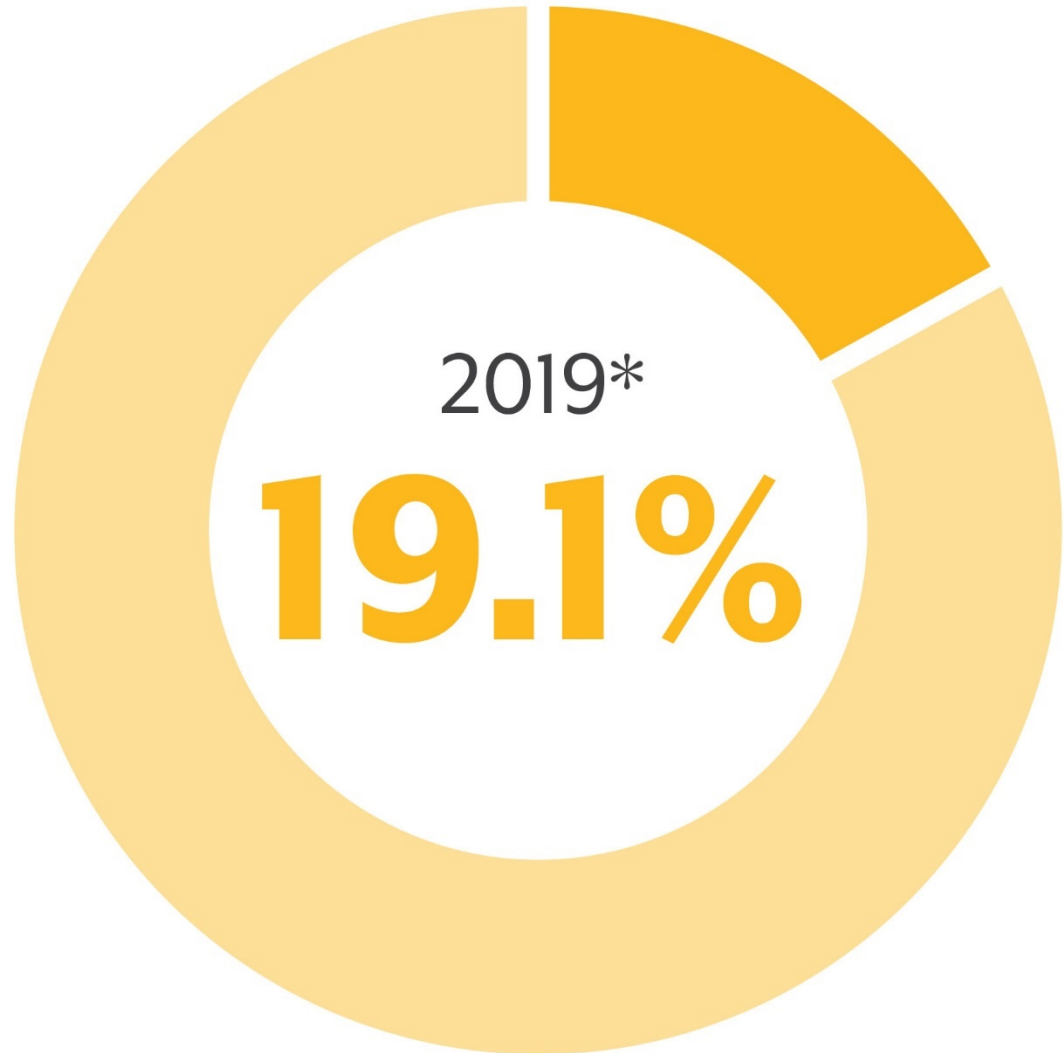

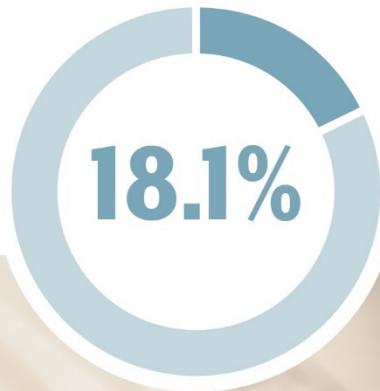

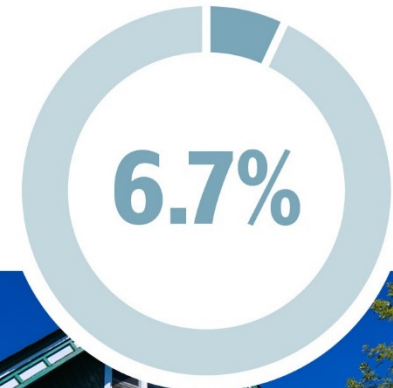

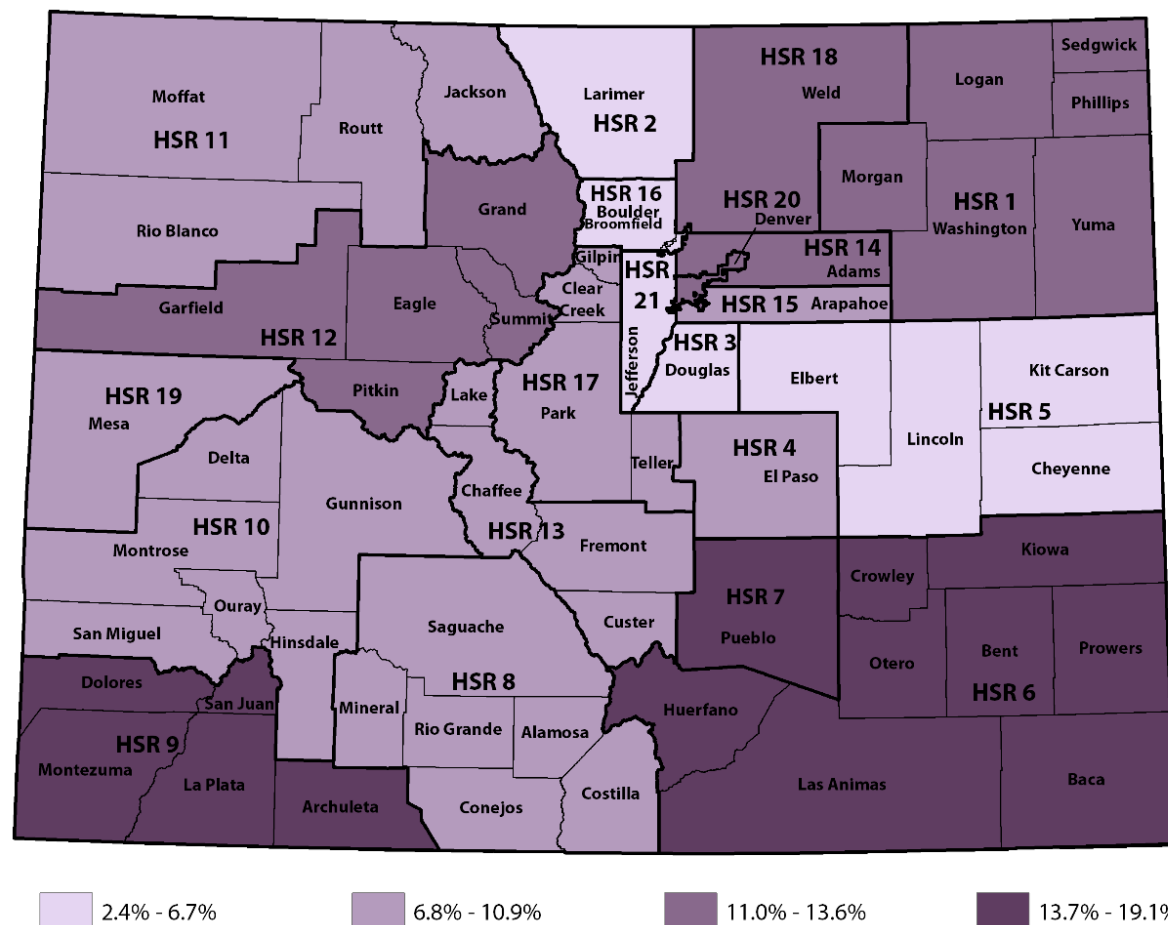
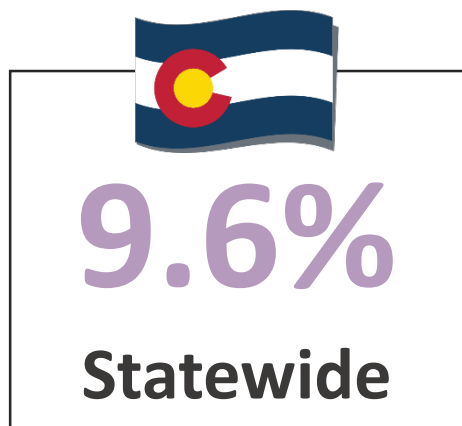
Food Insecurity

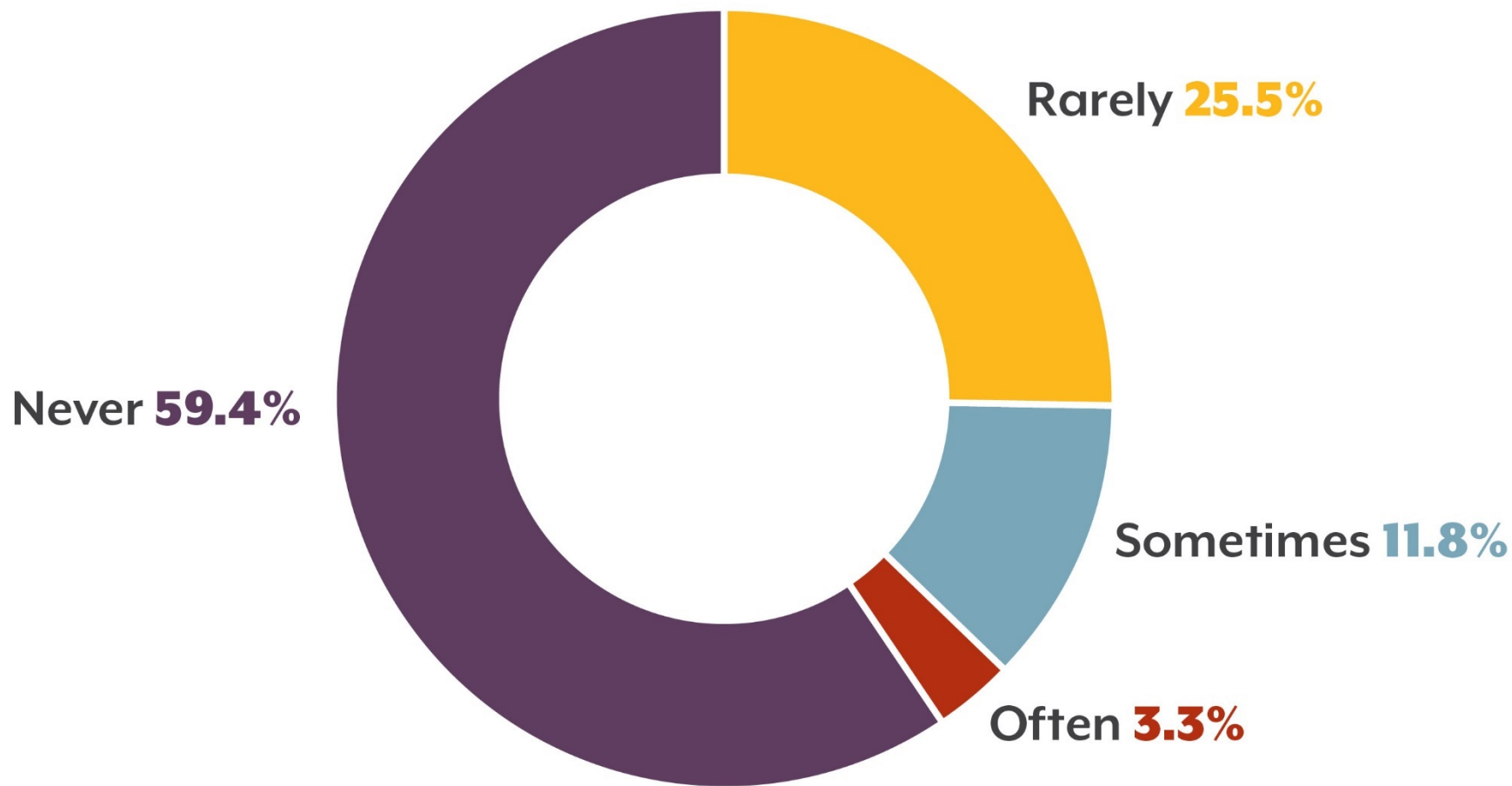

Ages 18+



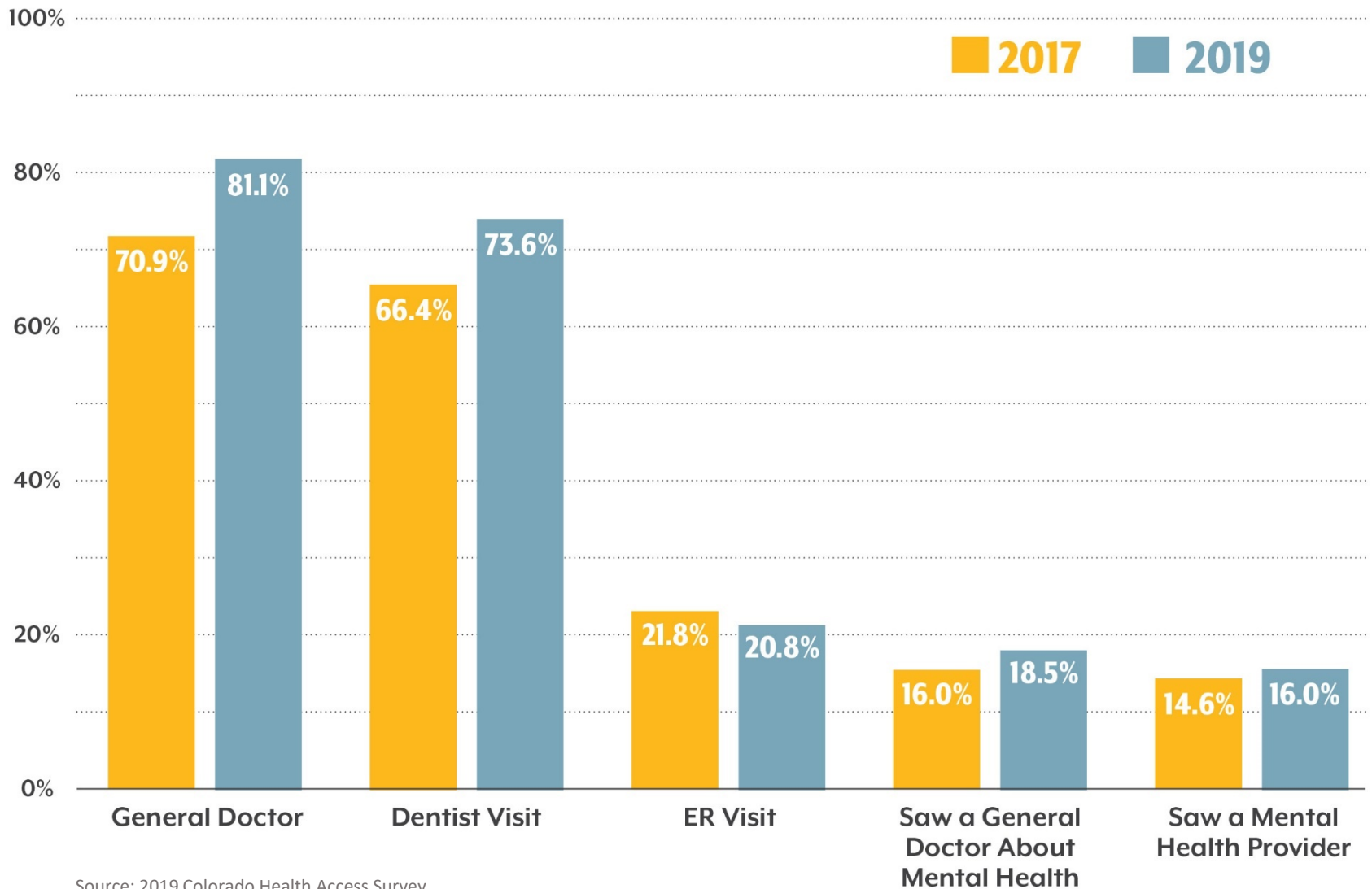

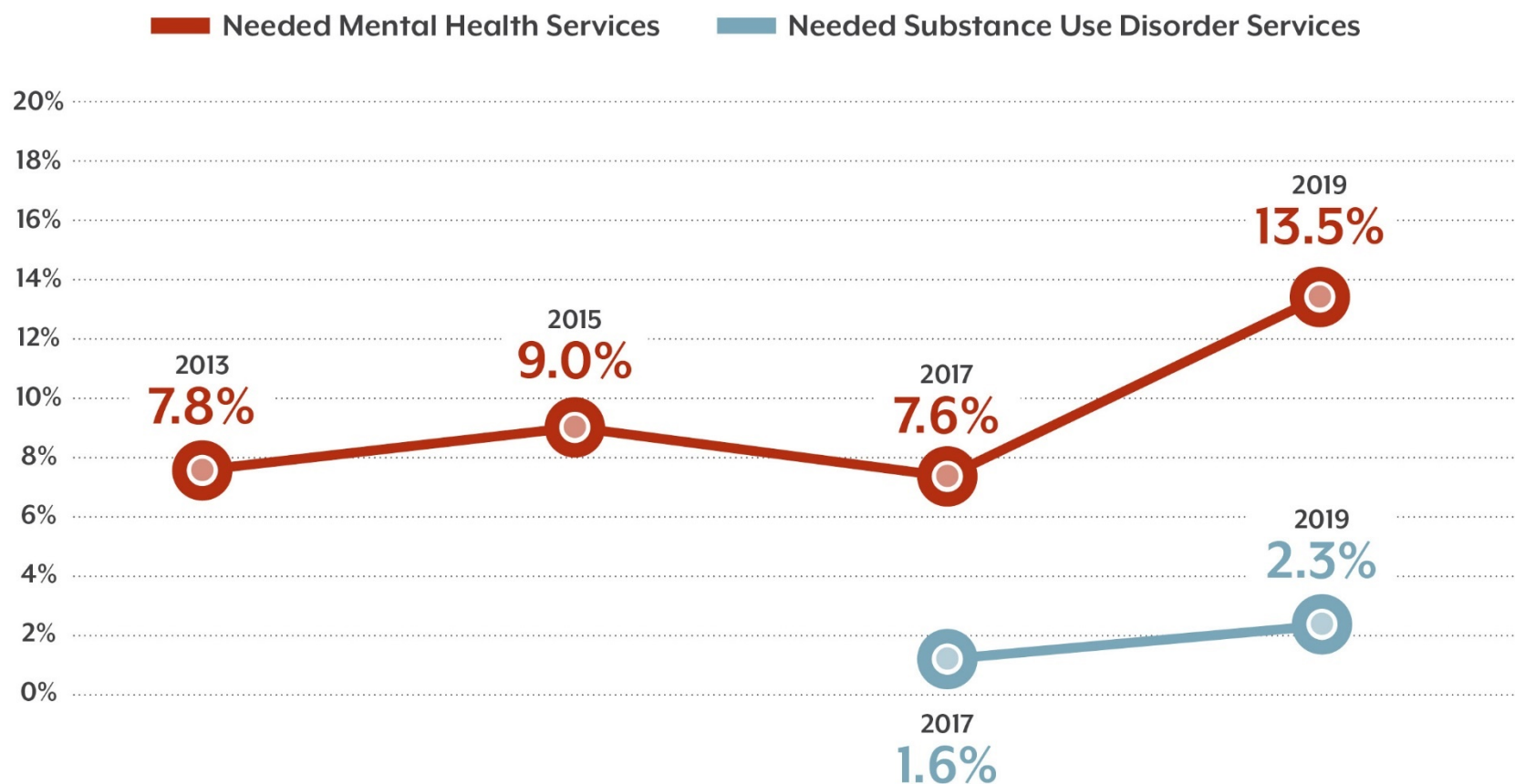

Cost of treatment	61.1% 394,185	47.7% 43,192
Did not feel comfortable talking about personal problems	38.2% 244,992	72.8% 64,836
Concerned about someone finding out you had a problem	31.3% 199,644	72.4% 64,754
Hard time getting an appointment	43.5% 269,787	32.9% 29,046
Did not think insurance would cover it	53.8% 300,234	52.1% 32,424

	Been addicted to alcohol or drugs other than prescription painkillers or heroin	25.2% 1,043,661
	Even once taken any drugs by injection with a needle like heroin, cocaine, amphetamines, or steroids	8.5% 348,807
	Received emergency medical treatment due to drug use	7.8% 322,308
	Died from a prescription painkiller or heroin overdose	5.0% 206,291

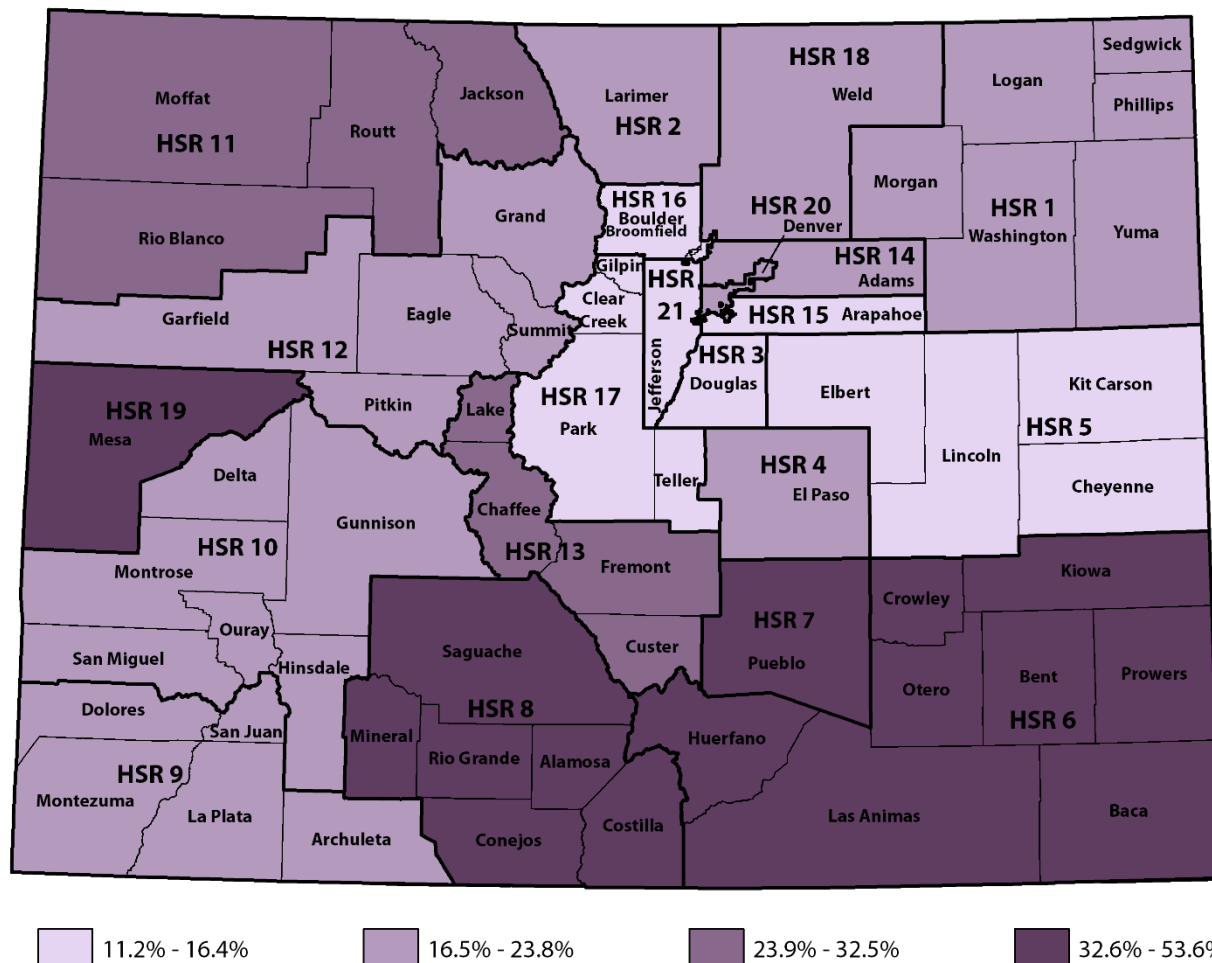

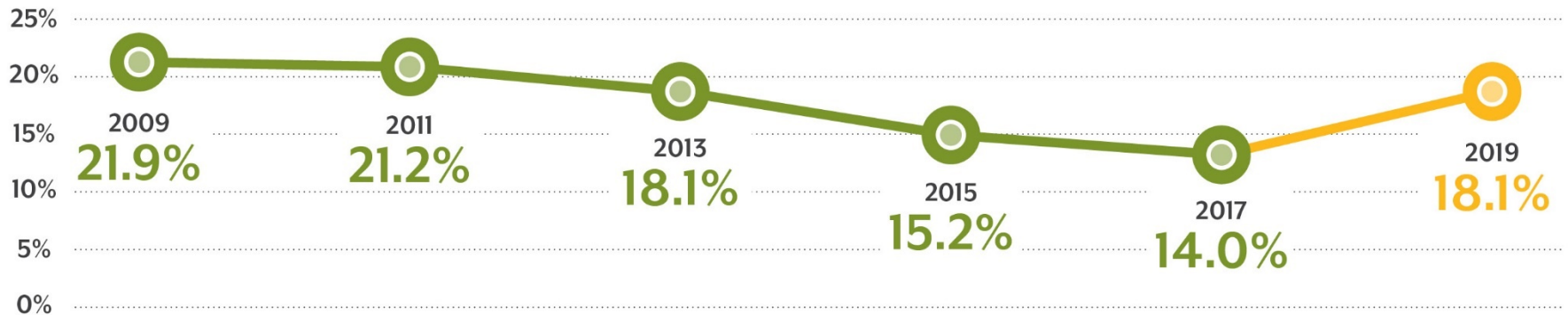

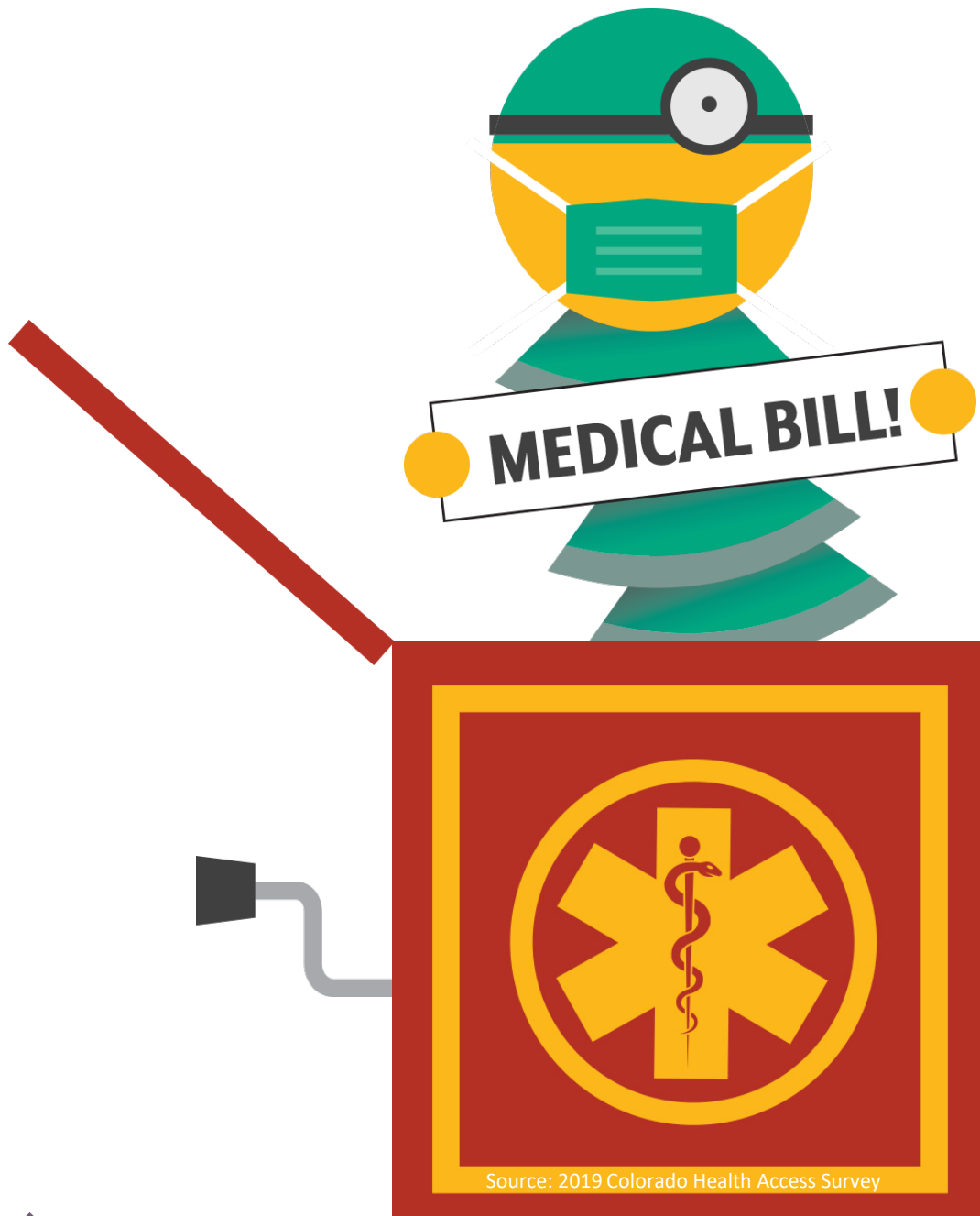
Warning Signs of a Backslide

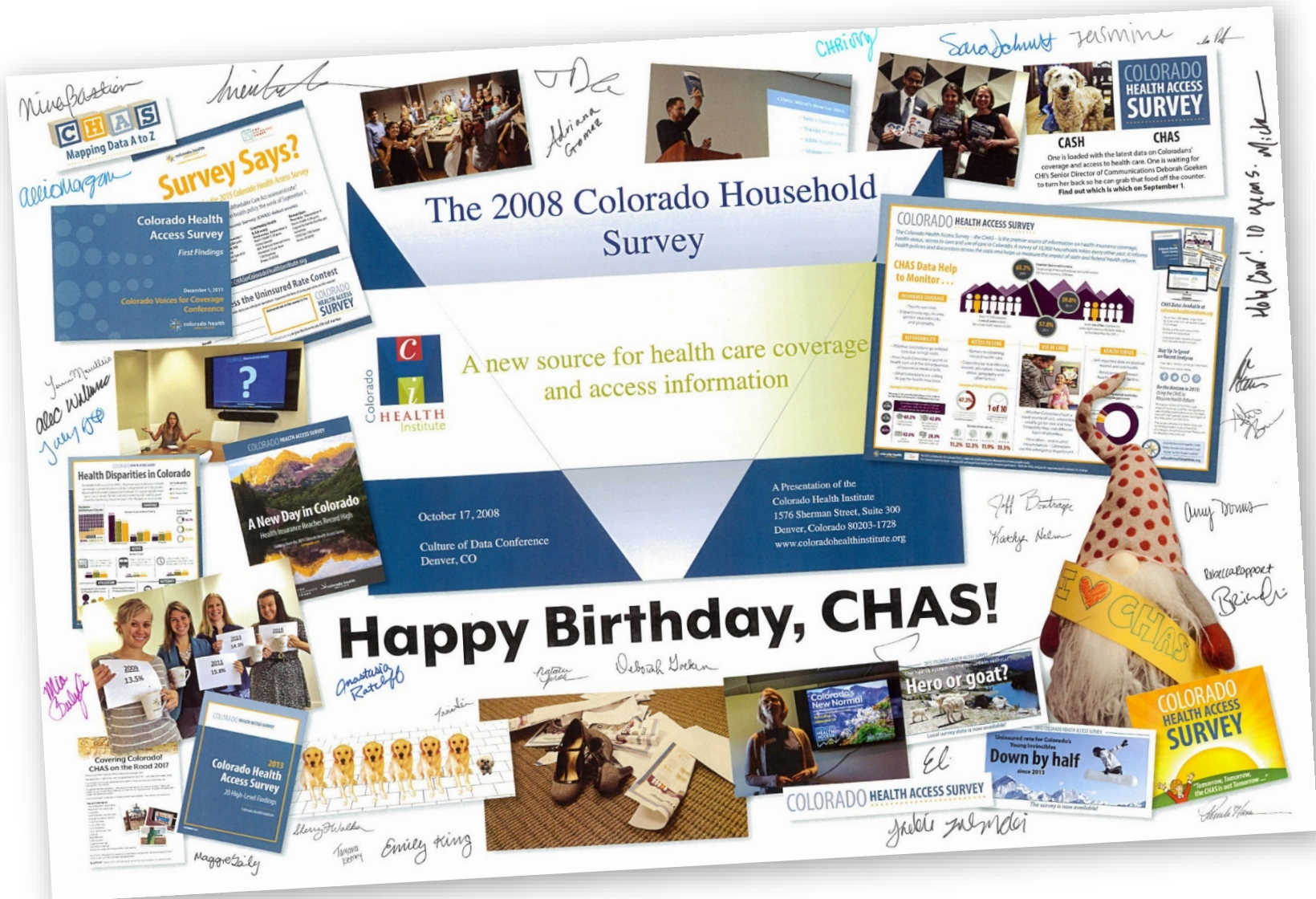
