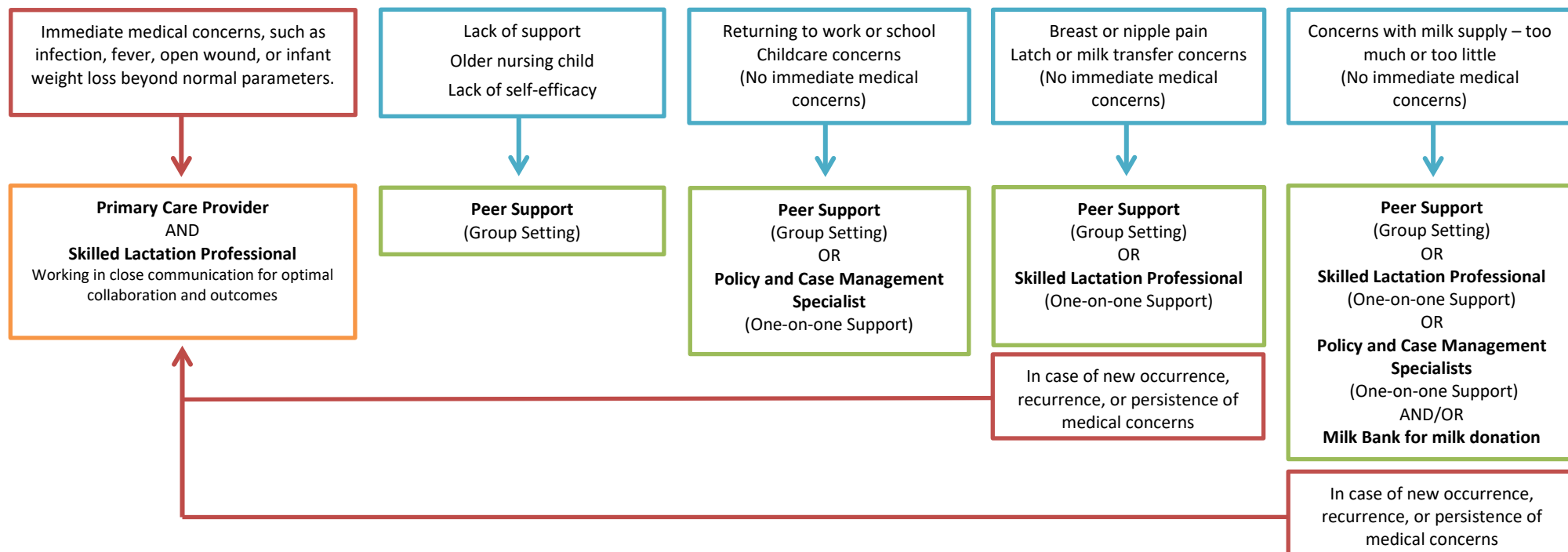

Definitions and Scopes of Work

International Board-Certified Lactation Consultants (IBCLC) have completed approximately five years of training and college-level advanced lactation education. IBCLCs possess the necessary skills, knowledge, and attitudes to provide quality breastfeeding assistance to babies and mothers. They specialize in the clinical management of breastfeeding, which includes: preventive healthcare, patient education, nutrition counseling, and therapeutic treatment. The IBCLC is generally prepared to work in any setting that provides breastfeeding support and care to mothers, infants, children, families, and communities. Settings that employ IBCLCs are inpatient, ambulatory, and community centers. IBCLCs are also trained to work independently.

Certified Lactation Counselors (CLC) have completed 45 hours of training and a comprehensive breastfeeding management course. Some hospital- or community-based CLCs may be in private practice and offer fee-based services. CLCs may need to refer families with challenging questions and concerns to an IBCLC.

WIC Peer Counselors have completed 30-50 hours of lactation training. They are mothers who have personal experience with breastfeeding and are trained to provide basic breastfeeding information and support to other mothers with whom they share various characteristics, such as language, race/ethnicity, and socioeconomic status. Peer counselors refer mothers with challenging questions and concerns to an IBCLC.

La Leche League Leaders are experienced breastfeeding mothers who are familiar with research related to breastfeeding. They offer practical information and encouragement to nursing mothers through monthly group meetings and one-to-one help.

Breastfeeding Friendly Environments are organizations, workplaces, educational institutions, and child care providers that foster policies and practices that support, promote, and protect breastfeeding for employees, students, and customers.

Baby Friendly Hospital Initiative is a global initiative of the World Health Organization and the United Nations Children’s Fund, implemented in the United States by Baby Friendly USA. It recognizes and rewards birthing facilities that successfully implement the Ten Steps to Successful Breastfeeding and the International Code of Marketing of Breast-milk Substitutes.
